Timeless Sponsor Suggestions

One of the most powerful suggestions my first Sponsor made to me was, "Always do more than just go to Meetings". Because he was a living example of the message relayed to me, it made a strong impression. AA offers seemingly infinite opportunities to do ' more than go to meetings'. Just ask any Oldtimer and a world of Service will be yours for the taking. You'll make quality friends, get away from self-centered thinking, Self-worth will appear,...or in other words, The Promises will become a strong part of your everyday life.

My second Sponsor used to frequently say to me, and when

speaking,..'Keep the channel clear' .I took that to mean a different way of saying: "See to it that your relationship with Him is right..." !!! For me that has been an encouragement to try to be Honest, Helpful, Loyal, Friendly, Entertaining, generous with my time, etc., etc, etc. If and when I find myself disloyal to Spiritual Principles, as I understand them, I am definitely uncomfortable. I have high expectations of myself because God has been very Generous and Patient with me. The 10th Step on my knees at night gets my "channel" clear. Especially if I take immediate action (with 24 hours) to set things right.

Step 3

"Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him."

Practicing Step Three is like the opening of a door which to all appearances is still closed and locked. All we need is a key, and the decision to swing the door open. There is only one key, and it is called willingness. Once unlocked by willingness, the door opens almost of itself, and looking through it, we shall see a pathway beside which is an inscription. It reads: "This is the way to a faith that works." In the first two Steps we were engaged in reflection. We say that we were powerless over alcohol, but we also perceived that faith of some kind, if only in A. A. itself, is possible to anyone. These conclusions did not require action; they required only acceptance.

Like all the remaining Steps, Step Three calls for affirmative action, for it is only by action that we can cut away the self-will which has always blocked the entry of God – or, if you like, a Higher Power – into our lives. Faith, to be sure, is necessary, but faith alone can avail nothing. We can have faith, yet keep God out of our lives. Therefore our problem now becomes just how and by what specific means shall we be able to let Him in? Step Three represents our first attempt to do this. In fact, the effectiveness of our whole A.A. program will rest upon how well and earnestly we have tried to come to "a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him."

To every worldly and practicalminded beginner, this Step looks hard, even impossible. No matter how much one wishes to try, exactly how can he turn his own will and his own life over to the care of whatever God he thinks there is? Fortunately, we who have tried it, and with equal misgivings, can testify that anyone, anyone at all, can begin to do it. We can further add that a beginning, even the smallest, is all that is needed. Once we have placed the key of willingness in the lock and have the door ever so slightly open, we find that we can always open it some more. Though self-will may slam it shut again, as it frequently does, it will always respond the moment we again pick up the key of willingness.

Third Tradition

"The only requirement for A. A. membership is a desire to stop drinking."

Early intolerance based on fear. To take away any alcoholic's chance at A.A., was sometimes to pronounce his death sentence. Membership regulations abandoned. Two examples of experience. Any alcoholic is a member of A.A. when *he* says so.

This tradition is packed with meaning. For A.A. is really saying to every serious drinker, "you are an A.A. member if

you say so. You can declare yourself in; nobody can keep you out. No matter who you are, no matter how low you've gone, no matter how grave your emotional complications – even your crimes – we still can't deny you A.A. We don't want to keep you out. We aren't a bit afraid you'll harm us, never mind how twisted or violent you may be. We just want to be sure that you get the same great chance for sobriety that we've had. So you're an A.A. member the minute you declare yourself."

To establish this principle of membership took years of harrowing experience. In our early time, nothing seemed so fragile, so easily breakable as an A.A. group. Hardly an alcoholic we approached paid any attention; most of those who did join us were like flickering candles in a windstorm. Time after time, their uncertain flames blew out and couldn't be relighted. Our unspoken, constant thought was "which of us may be the next?"
