Dear readers, over the next several months I'm going to present a number of installments of the history of the Open Door as it was compiled and written by Steve L., one of our AV longtimers.

OPEN DOOR HISTORY (Installment 1) by Steve L. (written in 2016)

The Open Door has a rich and controversial history, passed on from people who were sober at her conception. As we know, history is subject to memory, perception, and who gets to write it, and the Open Door's history is uncertain at best. We know the Open Door was started over bad feelings between Ike W. and the Arid Club (where most of the meetings were held at that time) and some very unpleasant speculations have been made as to the cause for that dissension. In this history we try to avoid rumor and speculation and attempt to stick to what facts could be gathered from those who were there.

One fact is that Ike did get a resentment (or ten) at some of the

people at the Arid Club, and vice versa. Ike was a more liberal and understanding member who was more concerned with helping drunks and drug addicts than what a person's race, politics, or sexual orientation was. His friend Mary Lou sobered up at the Nest before moving to the Antelope Valley. She had a history as a harder kind of woman, motorcycle clubs, etc., than the "ladies" of the Arid Club at that time. However, under her rough exterior, whatever Mary Lou's reputation, she had a good heart and was concerned with sobriety and she helped people feel a part of AA (she was my sponsor for some time, always supportive). She moved to Washington several years ago. Ike put heart and soul into working with newcomers. He died several years ago after a long illness.

So the two of them, in 1981, set out to find a new location for meetings. (to be continued)

Step 4

"Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves."

Creation gave us instincts for a purpose. Without them we wouldn't be complete human beings. If men and women didn't exert themselves to be secure in their persons, made no effort to harvest food or construct shelter, there would be no survival. If they didn't reproduce, the earth wouldn't be populated. If there were no social instinct, if men cared nothing for the society of one another, there would be no society. So these desires—for the sex relation, for material and emotional security, and for companionship—are perfectly necessary and right, and surely God-given.

Yet these instincts, so necessary for our existence, often far exceed their proper functions. Powerfully, blindly, many times subtly, they drive us, dominate us, and insist upon ruling our lives. Our desires for sex, for material and emotional security, and for an important place in society often tyrannize us. When thus out of joint, man's natural desires cause him great trouble, practically all the trouble there is. No human being, however good, is exempt from these troubles. Nearly every serious emotional problem can be seen as a case of misdirected instinct. When that happens, our great natural assets,

the instincts, have turned into physical and mental liabilities.

Step Four is our vigorous and painstaking effort to discover what these liabilities in each of us have been, and are. We want to find exactly how, when and where our natural desires have warped us. We wish to look squarely at the unhappiness this has caused others and ourselves. By discovering what our emotional deformities are, we can move toward their correction. Without a willing and persistent effort to do this, there can be little sobriety or contentment for us. Without a searching and fearless moral inventory, most of us have found that the faith which really works in daily living is still out of reach. G.ood O.rderly D.irection

The 4th Tradition

"Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole."

Autonomy is a ten-dollar word. But in relation to us, it means very simply that every A.A. group can manage its affairs exactly as it pleases, except when A.A. as a whole is threatened. Comes now the same question raised in Tradition One. Isn't such liberty foolishly dangerous?

Over the years, every conceivable deviation from our Twelve Steps and Traditions has

been tried. That was sure to be, since we are so largely a band of ego-driven individualists. Children of chaos, we have defiantly played with every brand of fire, only to emerge unharmed and, we think, wiser. These very deviations created a vast process of trial and error which, under the grace of God, has brought us to where we stand today.

When A.A.'s Traditions were first published, in 1946, we had become sure that an A.A. group could stand almost any amount of battering. We saw that the group, exactly like the individual, must eventually conform to whatever tested principles would guarantee survival. We had discovered that there was perfect safety in the process of trial and error. So confident of this had we become that the original statement of A.A. tradition carried this significant sentence: "Any two or three alcoholics gathered together for sobriety may call themselves an A.A. group provided that as a group they have no other affiliation."

This meant, of course, that we had been given the courage to declare each A.A. group an individual entity, strictly reliant on its own conscience as a guide to action. In charting this enormous expanse of freedom, we found it necessary to post only two storm signals: A group ought not do anything which would greatly injure A.A. as a whole, nor ought it affiliate itself with anything or anybody else. There would be real danger should we commence to call some groups "wet," others

"dry," still others "Republican" or Communist," and yet others "Catholic" or "Protestant." The A.A. group would have to stick to its course or be hopelessly lost. Sobriety had to be its sole objective. In all other respects there was perfect freedom of will and action. Every group had the right to be wrong.
