Happy 82nd birthday Alcoholics Anonymous!



Founder's Day- June 10, 1935

June is kind of a big deal around here!

From silkworth.net:

Early June, Bill W moved to Dr Bob's house at the request of Anne Smith. Bill insisted on keeping two bottles of liquor in the kitchen to prove that he and Bob could live in the presence of liquor. Both worked with alcoholics and went to Oxford Group meetings on Wednesday nights. Eventually meetings were held at Dr Bob's house and moved to the Williams' house in late 1936 or early 1937.

Jun 10 (more likely Jun 17)[after a multi-day binge on the way to, and at, an AMA convention in Atlantic City, NJ, a drunken Dr Bob was picked up at his office nurse's house in Cuyahoga Falls. Bob went through a 3-day sobering up period with Bill W's help. Scheduled for a surgery at City Hospital, Bob pronounced, "I am going through with this - I have placed both operation and myself in God's hands. I'm going to do what it takes to get sober and stay that way." Bill gave Bob a beer and a "goofball" to steady him prior to the surgery.

Jun 11 (more likely Jun 18), Dr Bob suggested that he and Bill W work with other alcoholics. A local Minister, J C Wright, provided them with a prospect. They tried in vain, throughout the summer, to sober up Edgar (Eddie) R (described as an "alcoholic atheist" and "able to produce a major crisis of some sort about every other day"). Eddie missed the chance to be AA #3.

Jun 28, Bill W, Dr Bob and Eddie R visited Bill D (Alcoholic Anonymous Number Three) at City Hospital. A prominent attorney in Akron, Bill D had been hospitalized 8 times in 1935 because of his drinking. Bill W and Bob visited Bill D every day. It took about 5 days for Bill D to say that he could not control his drinking. He checked out of the hospital on Jul 4 and within a

STEP SIX



What Is the Purpose of This Step?

Become fully prepared to rid yourself of the flaws listed in Step 4. This step reveals character and one's true willingness to recover.

Willingness

According to the *Oxford University* Press, *willingness* is defined as follows:

 the quality or state of being prepared to do something; readiness.:

For those of us that actively work The Twelve Steps, this principle may seem a bit redundant, as we've just DONE something absolutely life changing, STEP FIVE. If that doesn't demonstrate willingness, I don't know what does. Stand by! What's to come?

"Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character." p. 59

While this step is encompassed in a mere two paragraphs in *The Big Book*, the principle behind it is ever expansive. The idea of "readiness" is telling, of the continuity that is living the steps of Alcoholics Anonymous. Without *willingness*, this "design for living" will not work!

The 12x12 states, "THIS is the Step that separates the men from the boys.' So declares a wellloved clergyman who happens to be one of A.A.'s greatest friends. He goes on to explain that any person capable of enough willingness and honesty to try repeatedly Step Six on all his faults—without any reservations whatever—has indeed come a long way spiritually, and is therefore entitled to be called a man who is sincerely trying to grow in the image and likeness of his own Creator." (63)

Suggested Sixth Step Prayer #1

Dear God, I am ready for Your help In removing from me the defects of character Which I now realize are an obstacle to my recovery. Help me to continue being honest with myself & Guide me toward spiritual & mental health.

Suggested Sixth Step Prayer #2

God help me become willing to let go of all the things to which I still cling. Help me to be ready to let you remove all of these defects, that your will and purpose may take their place. AMEN



What does the Sixth Step mean to you?

For me, the sixth step was about my character defects that I learned about earlier in 4th step. This step is about how to be willing for God to remove them and the short comings I made with them. I've learned through the steps that I was a character defect in my disease, and that I can be a character defect in my sobriety. We all get here to AA with some sad, mad stories to tell. And a lot of them stem from chaos relationships that we have been in. As the saying goes "hurt people hurt people"; I'm no different. The steps showed me in these type relationships how my character defects would always get me drunk. I would hurt whoever I was seeing with my words or with my actions and then of course they would retaliate and do the same to me. You know, the name calling, the lies, the cheating. So then me being in pain, me being hurt, I would go get drunk. This was my solution to deal with the pain. At least of course until the next fight and then it would start all over again. It was a circle of madness that I couldn't or wouldn't get out of...

But because of the steps and being in recovery I've learned that today, we don't have to go through it, we grow through it. When it comes relationships, dealing with someone who comes at me foul, or just trying to hurt me, it's because I'm in character defect mode. I don't get drunk over it. Well for me that's growth, that's recovery. But the real growth for me is when I don't retaliate with some character defects and instead I apply a spiritual principle. Now that's growing through it, that's recovery.

The 6thTradition

An AA group ought never endorse, finance or lend the AA name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property and prestige

divert us from our primary purpose. (12x12, p. 156)

Editorial by Bill W. - A.A.
Grapevine, May 1948
The sixth of our 12 Points of A.A.
Tradition is deemed so important that it states at length the relation of the A.A. movement to money and property.

Too detailed to print here, this Tradition declares in substance that the accumulation of money, property and the unwanted personal authority so often generated by material wealth comprise a cluster of serious hazards against which an A.A. group must ever be on guard. Tradition 6 also enjoins the group never to go into business nor ever to lend the A.A. name or money credit to any "outside" enterprise, no matter how good. Strongly expressed is the opinion that even clubs should not bear the A.A. name; that they ought to be separately incorporated and managed by those individual A.A.s who need or want clubs enough to financially support them. We would thus divide the spiritual from the material, confine the A.A. movement to its sole aim and insure (however wealthy as individuals we may become) that A.A itself shall always remain poor. We dare not risk the distractions of corporate wealth. Years of experience have proven these principles beyond doubt. They have become certainties, absolute verities for us. Thank God, we A.A.s have never yet been caught in the kind of religious or political disputes which embroil the world of today. But we

ought to face the fact that we have

often quarreled violently about money, property and the administration thereof. Money, in quantity, has always been a baleful influence in group life. Let a wellmeaning donor present an A.A. group with a sizeable sum and we break loose. Nor does trouble abate until that group, as such, somehow disposes of its bank roll. This experience is practically universal. "But," say our friends, "isn't this a confession of weakness? Other organizations do a lot of good with money. Why not A.A.?" Of course, we of A.A. would be the first to say that many a fine enterprise does a lot of good with a lot of money. To these efforts, money is usually primary; it is their life blood. But money is not the life blood of A.A. With us, it is very secondary. Even in small quantities, it is scarcely more than a necessary nuisance, something we wish we could do without entirely. Why is that so?

We explain this easily enough; we don't need money. The core of our A.A. procedure is "one alcoholic talking to another," whether that be sitting on a curbstone, in a home, or at a meeting. It's the message, not the place; it's the talk, not the alms. That does our work. Just places to meet and talk, that's about all A.A. needs. Beyond these, a few small offices, a few secretaries at their desks, a few dollars a piece a year, easily met by voluntary contributions. Trivial indeed, *our* expenses!

Nowadays, the A.A. group answers its well wishers saying, "Our expenses are trifling. As good earners, we can easily pay them. As we neither need nor want money, why risk its hazards? We'd rather stay poor. Thanks just the same!" Bill W.



Concept VI

On behalf of A.A. as a whole, our General Service Conference has the principal responsibility for the maintenance of our world services, and it traditionally has the final decision respecting large matters of general policy and finance. But the Conference also recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most of these matters should be exercised primarily by the Trustee members of the Conference when they act among themselves as the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous. We have seen that the "final responsibility and ultimate authority" for A.A.'s service activities rest with the A.A. groups (Concept I), but to carry out this responsibility they must delegate to the Conference (Concept II). The Conference, in turn, must delegate administrative authority to the General Service

Board of Trustees. Again, it is helpful if you are familiar with both the Conference Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board to understand this relationship and the freedom of action that the trustees must have. The trustees have the legal and practical responsibility for the operation of A.A. World Services, Inc. (which embraces A.A. publishing as well as the General Service Office) and of the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. These entities have a combined cash flow of many millions of dollars annually. The trustees are also responsible for A.A.'s public information activities. They are the guardians of the Twelve Traditions. They are responsible for carrying the A.A. message to other countries around the world. They are A.A.'s "bankers," overseeing the financial operations and investing A.A.'s substantial Reserve Fund. (Read the text of Concept XI for a more detailed account of their functions.) Bill makes the point that although "our objective is always a spiritual one," nevertheless our world service is a "large business operation." "Indeed," he says, "our whole service structure resembles that of a large corporation. The A.A. groups are the stockholders, the delegates represent them, like proxyholders, at the annual meeting; the General Service Board Trustees are actually the directors of a 'holding company.' And this holding company (the General Service Board) actually owns and controls the two 'subsidiaries' (A.A.W.S and the A.A. Grapevine) which carry on the . . . services. "This very real analogy makes it . . . clear that, like any other board of directors, our trustees must be given large powers if they are to manage the . . . affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous."
